In addition to assessment services, the extern provides consultation with clinical and education staff and conducts treatment groups addressing common issues such as trauma, substance abuse, and emotion regulation.

Additionally, HS/EHS allows parents to get involved with in their child's development, offers home-based and center-based program options, provides nutrition, medical and dental care, and ensures social and emotional engagement for enrolled children.
