Spotlight on Trans Collaborations!

Trans Collaborations is an academic-community partnership focused on reducing health and mental health disparities for individuals who identify as transgender or gender diverse (TGD) in underserved areas. Founded six years ago by CPTP faculty member Deb Hope, Richard Morcarski (University of Nebraska-Kearney) and community leader Nathan Woodruff, Trans Collaborations involves a true partnership with TGD communities who collaboratively set the research agenda and interpret findings through our local community board. Recent studies include two analyses of affirming practices portrayed on the websites for gender therapists, a systematic review of evidence-based practice in the clinical literature, and reviews and psychometric studies of self-report measures. The team has developed a progress monitoring tool for psychological services called the Trans Collaborations Clinical Check-In (TC3) and forthcoming principles of affirming psychological services. Our community board developed Camp BOLD, a sleep-away camp experience for transgender youth and their families, now in its third year. 



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Psychological Consultation Center (PCC)

- During the 2020 fiscal year, the PCC served 124 clients who were seen for an average of 12 sessions. The PCC also provided 8 comprehensive evaluations during this period.
- Over half of clients utilized the sliding scale fees at the PCC, paying as little as five dollars per session.
- Although the PCC does service UNL students, 80% of PCC clients are from the larger community of southeastern Nebraska.
- Most referrals to the PCC came from word of mouth, Internet searches, local agencies, and the UNL Health Center.
- In addition to general services offered by the PCC, there are five specialty clinics housed within the clinic: the Family Interaction Skills Clinic (FISC), Rainbow Clinic, Substance Abuse Clinic (SAC), Telehealth Clinic, and Trauma Recovery Clinic (TRC). Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, the PCC has made modifications to increase safety and minimize the spread of COVID-19. As part of UNL's response to the COVID-19 pandemic, therapists have been seeing clients through remote sessions to ensure the safety of clients and therapists. Telehealth procedures were updated to ensure client confidentiality while therapists deliver services using Doxy.me for HIPAA-compliant telehealth sessions. As of July 2021, the PCC is gradually starting to open back up to in-person appointments. Thanks to all therapists and supervisors for their flexibility during this time!
